## Port artist exhibits in Main Gallery

Port Washington artist Rachelle Krieger exhibits *Expressions of Nature*, a series of oil paintings, through June 28. The Art Advisory Council hosts a reception for the artist on Saturday, June 2 from 2 to 4 p.m.

Ms. Krieger was born in New York City in 1967. Her work has been exhibited in galleries throughout the United States and abroad. She has had several one-person shows, including those at the Mulligan-Shanoski Gallery in San Francisco, the Karen Mitchell Frank Gallery in Dallas and the Federal Building in Jamaica, Queens. In addition, her work has been featured in many group shows including those at the Simon Gallery in New Jer-



sey, the Judi Rotenberg Gallery in Boston, the Wyndy Morehead Gallery in New Orleans and the Taylor Jardine Gallery in London.

An award-winning painter, Rachelle Krieger has been honored with the Mark Rothko Memorial Scholarship, the Alexander Medal, and the Award for Excellence in Design from Pratt Institute. She received a BFA from Pratt Institute in 1989, and has studied at the Art Students League and New York Studio School in Manhattan.

Her paintings are part of numerous private and corporate collections including those at the Texas State Bank; Hale & Dorr in Boston; and Rauscher Pierce in Houston.

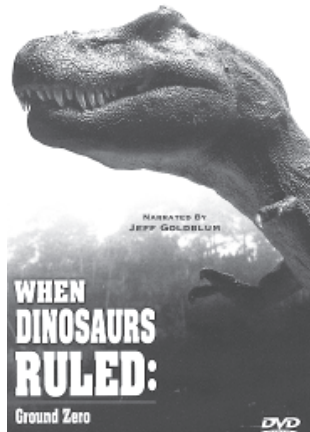
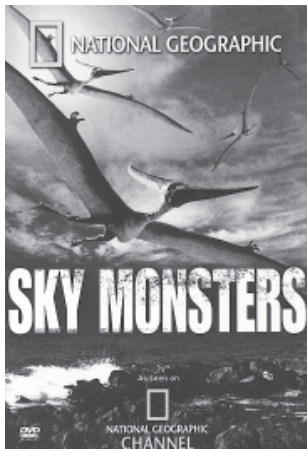

## SoundSwap film event:

### The U.S. vs. John Lennon

Join us on Thursday, June 21 at 7:30 p.m. for a SoundSwap Film Event: *The U.S. vs. John Lennon* (2006-96 min.).

The story of John Lennon's transformation from mop-topped Beatle to crusader for world peace forms the core of this film by David Leaf and John Scheinfeld. Lennon's anti-war sentiments, outspoken nature, high visibility, and leftist connections made him a target for the paranoid Nixon administration and his chief watchdog J. Edgar Hoover. The film sheds light on Lennon's crusade — a deeply serious effort softened by humorous events and musical "happenings" — and features some key appearances from the period. It is also a disturbing look at the methods of persecution employed by a fragile govern-

ment seeking to remove a "troublemaker."

Tony Truquardo will present a number of related, rarely-seen Lennon clips before the film, and will also moderate a post-film Q&A discussion.

## Fire Department and library celebrate new oral history and website

Over 150 people gathered at the library recently for the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Port Washington Fire Department and the debut of a website and oral history project that will preserve the history of our dedicated and very special volunteer fire services.

Organized by ex-chief Peter Zwerlein and library oral historian Elly Shodell, the reception also honored the more than 50 men and women who participated in oral history interviews describing their work and lives in the fire department. In their recordings, they remembered chiefs, hooks and ladders, lucky charms, fires, wives and families, the Ladies Auxiliary, signals, social life, "wet downs," "rowdies, rangers and runts," changes in the community, and much more. Guiding the process were two talented interviewers, Sally Wendkos Olds and Margaret Dildilian, with additional memoirs gathered by Christina Southard and Peter Zwerlein (Gerry Crooker and Tom Mahoney, in 1984). Frank Pavlak provided archival support and resources.

During his presentation of the "Answering the Call: The His-

tory of the Port Washington Volunteer Fire Department" website, Peter Zwerlein played audio excerpts from interviews, showed samples of the thousands of pictures and newspaper articles he digitized and captioned, and described how to navigate through the elements. Library users, students, educators, researchers and community members can access the stories, insights and rare vintage fire department material through either [www.pwpl.org](http://www.pwpl.org) or

Thanks to the leadership of the Boards of both the Port Washington Public Library and the Port Washington Fire Department, this cooperative project has resulted in 58 interviews, 3000 pages of transcript, a detailed and lively website, audio excerpts from more than 60 hours of tape, historical narrative about Protection, Flower Hill, Atlantics and Fire Medic Companies, and visuals and newspaper articles dating back to 1888.

### Ride 'n Read resumes at LIRR station

Library service to Long Island Railroad commuters resumes July 11. The Port Washington Public Library will be on-site at the LIRR station every Wednesday morning (weather permitting) from 7 to 9 a.m. through September 5. To help make your commute more enjoyable, a collection of popular paperbacks will be available for you to borrow.

You don't need your library card to borrow books. After 14 days, simply return the books to the library table at the station on Wednesday mornings or to the library.

### Government documents:

#### Practical information for daily living

Visit the Reference Room for government information. We maintain a comprehensive collection of directories, manuals, documents, maps and clippings covering a wide range of subjects at every level of government. In addition to federal directories, guides, and budgets, we can provide information on contacting your government representatives, supply you with voter registration forms and absentee ballot applications, and direct you to local government and social services offices. We have publications on emergency management and evacuation procedures, and our map file includes FEMA Long Island flood maps. We receive New York State financial reports and planning documents.

On a more local level, we have a wealth of material on issues of environmental and civic interest, such as the use of the Munsey Park Cleaners site, the LIRR multi-level parking proposal, and the restoration of Stannards Brook Park. We have copies of the local Shared Vision Plan for the Port Washington Peninsula, which was recently completed following an extensive cooperative effort between local government agencies, Port's six villages, and

area organizations, such as the Residents for a More Beautiful Port Washington, the Port Washington Business Improvement District and the General Council of Homeowner Associations.

The Town of North Hempstead provides us with codes and ordinances, proposed and final budgets, and zoning maps. Our villages and special districts are also represented in our collection. We receive documents, policy statements, budgets and publications from the Villages of Baxter Estates, Manorhaven, Port Washington North and Sands Point. Special districts such as the Water, Fire, Police, Garbage and Water Pollution Control Districts provide us with information and reports. The School District is well represented, and we have a comprehensive collection of budgets, newsletters, board agendas, minutes of meetings, calendars, handbooks and other publications. Our own library document collection includes board minutes, newsletters, statistical reports, copies of policies and procedures and historical items.

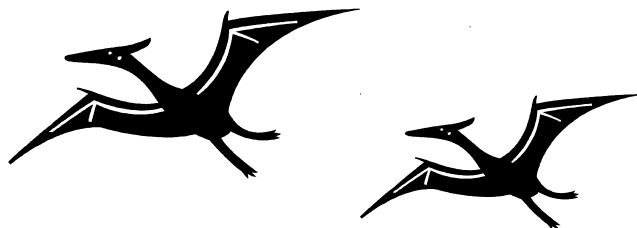

## Dinosaur Display

Media Services director Jonathan Guildroy first fell in love with dinosaurs as a 6-year-old visiting the 1964 World's Fair in Flushing. The appeal of these prehistoric monsters was immediately evident — they were huge, fantastic and ferocious! Ever since then he has collected dinosaur toys, books, cards, models, magazines and skull reproductions. He has also drawn hundreds of dinosaurs and modeled them in Sculpey. This summer, Jonathan will display some of his collection of miniature dinosaurs in the Children's Room. For the record, his favorite prehistoric creature is Dimetrodon, a sail-backed pelycosaur that actually predates the dinosaurs by a few million years.
